In Jesus, God has fulfilled the greatest promise of all: his promise that a Messiah was coming. Matthew 1-2

The book of Matthew provides us with one of the most familiar accounts in the Bible of the birth and infancy of Jesus:

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it is written by the prophet:

And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,

are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel:" Matthew 2:1-6

Don't let the familiarity of this account cause you to rush over its hope-giving glory. When Herod went to Old Testament scholars to inquire where the promised Messiah was to be born, they had no problem answering. They immediately quoted Micah 5:2. Now, pause and think about this for a moment. It's not just that the Messiah's birth was promised in a general, nonspecific way. The promise of God, made through the prophet Micah many generations before, was specific- down to



the exact town in which he would be born. The King of kings wouldn't have a regal birth in a royal palace in Jerusalem, with an adoring court at his cradle. No, the hope of the world would be born in the town of Bethlehem to a mother and father who were far from the royalty of that day.

Every detail of Jesus's birth was part of God's plan before the foundations of the earth were set in place. So the promises and prophecies of his birth were detailed and specific. God is not like a fortune teller, delivering a safe, generic prediction. No, these promises were made by the Lord of heaven and earth, who rules everything, everywhere, all of the time. You see, the promises of God are only as good as the extent of his sovereignty, because he can guarantee the delivery of his promises only in situations over which he has rule. Because he rules

everything, everywhere, all of the time, however, his promises are specific and rock-solid.

The specificity of God's promise about where the Messiah would be born is a picture of how infinitely confident God is in his own ability to do whatever he has said he will do, wherever he said he will do it, and whenever he knows the time is right. You can bank on and build your life upon the promises of God.

He has the power, willingness, and authority to do everything he has promised to do. It is so good to know today that you can absolutely trust that he will do what he has said he will do.

As many of you know, the year of 2024 has been unusually challenging for Carole and I due to a variety of health issues. Carole experienced a "widow maker" heart attack in February from which she has recovered and I experienced a broken right hip on March 9th which required surgery for a full titanic hip replacement followed by many weeks of therapy. I feel like I have fully recovered from this for which I am grateful.

However, due to the trauma of the hip replacement, I then experienced an inguinal hernia which lasted until I could have surgery on Aug. 9th. From which I believe I have fully recovered from.

Nevertheless, shortly thereafter I was scheduled for surgery due to another bout of cancer in my left eyelid. This required two doctors, working in tandem, with each other to perform surgery to remove the cancer on 9/24 and the second doctor to perform reconstructive surgery the following day – 9/25. Since then, I have been and still remain in a state of healing which, although improving, has compromised my ability to see clearly out of my left eye due to the scarring resulting from the surgeries. The doctor is pleased with the present results and is hopeful that complete healing will occur in another month or two. We are grateful for the many people who have been and continue to pray for my healing, as well as Carole's continued good health.

As you might expect, during this extension of surgeries and recoveries the many restrictions on my ability to continue a "normal" lifestyle has been compromised in several ways. Nevertheless, I have endeavored to do what I could to fulfill my pastoral responsibilities to the best of my ability. I am very grateful to those who have sacrificially filled in for me when I was physically unable to do so.

During these times of surgeries and recoveries, I have sensed God's presence, peace, love and faithfulness in very special ways, for which I am exceedingly thankful.

As we journey into the year ahead, let us all remain faithful to serve our Lord and Master until that day when we will rejoice forever in His presence.

Lasting Peace in a Broken World

You may have heard this statement before: "Don't let the world teach you theology." I have often heard my friend and fellow DTS graduate Michael Easley say it.

This warning especially deserves attention as we enter the last quarter of the year. Even in good times, the world preaches a "sermon" of anxiety and worry. But these days, it seems that the world is shouting that "sermon" at us daily.

So how should you and I respond? How can we turn off this "sermon" in our head without becoming a recluse on a faraway mountain or isolating in the middle of a desert? The answer for Christians is this: You and I can choose peace right where we are.

In Hebrew, the word peace— "shalom"—pictures "everything as it should be."

The problem is that our world isn't as it was created to be. Every day, we encounter the reality of a broken world, with hard circumstances abounding. Disruptions of various kinds may upset our peace. Our relationships aren't always as they should be. We may experience anxiety due to our materialistic and fast-paced culture.

Yet God gives us a way to have "shalom"—with our thinking "as it should be"—in each one of these problem areas!

Through His Holy Spirit indwelling you, God gives you the power to choose peace (Romans 8:6). And He gives you the pattern of thinking—content to fill your mind—as you focus on the truths

found in His Word (Romans 12:2).

I know this from experience. I've been a church elder and pastor. I've sat with devoted Christians I care about who were in extremely difficult, painful circumstances. Thy Kingdom Come

The Coming Golden Age by Dr. David Jeremiah

Editor's note: In The Coming Golden Age, Dr. David Jeremiah teaches us what to expect in the future when Jesus returns and how the coming reign of Christ affects our daily lives today. The King is coming, and we have a part to play in this story that promises to set right all that is wrong and usher in a new golden age. Enjoy this excerpt.

Gerald Ford, his head bowed in reverence, was reciting the Lord's Prayer when he learned he was about to become president of the United States. He had gathered for a weekly prayer meeting in the office of John Rhodes, minority leader of the House of Representatives. Also present were Minnesota congressman Albert Quie and Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird. This group gathered each Wednesday to pray for the nation and for one another, but today was tense. They were on the cusp of an unprecedented moment in American history: the resignation of an embattled president. After each of the men had prayed individually, they offered in unison the Lord's prayer: *Your Kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.*

Suddenly Rhodes's secretary entered the room and said, "I know I'm never supposed to interrupt this meeting, but considering the circumstances I think I should. The White House just called and said Jerry Ford should come down to the White House right away."

No one needed to ask why. Congressman Quie asked, "Jerry... What if, when you have a press conference, somebody should ask you, 'Where were you and what were you doing when you found out that you were going to be the president?"

"Nobody's going to say that," said Ford on his way out the door.¹

The Watergate Scandal is only one of thousands of crises that have jerked the history of the world like a rag doll. Think of other unexpected events that have upset the trajectories of the human story — the fall of Babylon in the days of Daniel; the sack of Rome by the Visigoths in AD 410; the victory of William the Conqueror in England in 1066; the assassination of Austrian archduke Franz Ferdinand that sparked World War I; the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941; the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991; the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001.

It seems history is lurching along with no rhyme or reason, subject to the blowing of the wind or the falling of the dice, and the world is destined to end in the ashes of ultimate catastrophe. Historian Henry Steele Commager said, "History is a jangle of accidents, blunders, surprises, and absurdities, and so is our knowledge of it."²

But never forget the Lord reigns!

His throne is secure in the heavens, and He rules behind the scenes and beneath the surface of the tides of history. Like a river that flows beneath the ground then surges to the surface for all to see, His rule will burst forth with cascading power when Jesus comes again.

I want to impress upon you this fact: the millennial Kingdom of Jesus Christ will be the great fulfillment of the prayer taught to us by Jesus: *Your Kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.* - Matthew 6:10

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Every day, millions of Christians say that prayer in hundreds of languages in thousands of diverse settings and situations. It has been so for the last two thousand years. No prayer has been more frequently uttered, more meaningfully offered, and more urgently needed. Even now, as you read these words, someone, somewhere, is praying the sixtysix words of the Lord's Prayer.

I want to suggest that when we pray, "Your Kingdom come," we're praying for two parallel realities. There are two phases of the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus. The first is the present reality of the Kingdom of grace, the church of the Lord Jesus, which is growing in the world right now. Jesus is the King over the hearts of millions of people who are following Him in their homes and to the ends of the earth.

But the ultimate fulfillment of this second petition of the Lord's Prayer will be answered as soon as Christ returns and sets up a visible, geopolitical Kingdom headquartered in Jerusalem.

We are a spiritual Kingdom in a physical world.

The Kingdom of Grace

I want to introduce you to a phrase Bible scholars use to describe the kingdom of God: already but not yet. Have you heard that? This phrase was coined over a hundred years ago by Princeton theologian Geerhardus Vos and made popular by another scholar, George Eldon Ladd, in the 1950s. **The idea is that the Kingdom of Heaven is already here, but it has not yet come in its fullness.**

Ladd wrote, "The Word of God does say that the Kingdom of God is a present spiritual reality... At the same time, the Kingdom is an inheritance which God will bestow upon His people when Christ comes in glory... The Kingdom is a present reality (Matthew 12:28), and yet it is a future blessing (Romans 14:17). It is an inner spiritual redemptive blessing (Romans 14:17), which can be experienced only by way of the new birth (John 3:3), and yet it will have to do with the government of the nations of the world (Revelation 11:15)."

Ladd continued, "Therefore, what we pray for is 'Thy Kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven.' This prayer is a petition for God to reign, to manifest His kingly sovereignty and power, to put to flight every enemy of righteousness and of His divine rule, that God alone may be King over all the world."³

Those of us who know Jesus Christ as our Lord are currently at this moment — citizens of the Kingdom of God on this earth. We are walking models of those who have allowed the Lord to reign on the throne of our hearts. We are Kingdom people, infiltrating the earth for His purposes.

Jesus began His preaching ministry with the news of the imminent appearing of the Kingdom of God. He said,

Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand. — Matthew 4:17

He also said,

Let the little children come to Me, and do not forbid them; for of such is the Kingdom of God. — Mark 10:14

In Luke 17:21, He said, The Kingdom of God is within you. When Jesus stood before Pilate, He said, My Kingdom is not of this world. If My Kingdom were of this world, My servants would fight. — John 18:36

When the Holy Spirit descended on the 120 disciples in the upper room in Jerusalem shortly after the ascension of Jesus Christ, the church came into sudden and sublime existence. The word kingdom means the king's domain; so, those who acknowledge Jesus Christ as Lord are His people, His possession.

We are a spiritual Kingdom in a physical world.

Our Lord told us in Matthew 12:28, But if I cast out demons by the Spirit of God, surely the Kingdom of God has come upon you.

Paul wrote, For the Kingdom of God is not eating or drinking, but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit. — Romans 14:17

In Colossians 1:13, he added, He has delivered us from the power of darkness and conveyed us into the Kingdom of the Son of His love.

When you pray for God's Kingdom on earth, you are praying for the spread of the gospel and the expansion of the church. When you pray for the missionaries God places on your heart, when you engage in mission trips around the world, when you give to ministries that are reaching the globe, when you intercede for your own local churches — you are echoing the prayer of Christ. You are asking God to let His Kingdom come to all the earth.



Christian Widows Displaced by Islamists

Hawa is a Christian convert from Islam who maintains a farm in a rural area of Somalia. Though raised as a Muslim, Hawa became a follower of Christ through her son's witness. Hawa's Muslim husband divorced her and kicked her out of the house when he learned of her newfound faith. Through another Christian woman, Hawa came to help work and maintain the farm, which also houses 19 Christian widows whose husbands had been killed by al-Shabab, a terrorist group active in Somalia and Kenya. Hawa disciples the widows and actively shares her faith with other women who work on neighboring farms. In March 2024, fighting broke out between al-Shabab and the Somali government, destroying some of the crops, displacing Hawa and the widows, and killing one of the women. VOM helped provide food and shelter for the displaced Christians until they could return to the farm and begin replanting crops.

October 17, 2024 | Colombia Pastor and Family Flee for Lives from "Red Zone" Guerrillas

After months of seeing villagers and friends extorted, abused and killed by violent guerrillas who control the dangerous "red zones" of Colombia, Pastor Santiago and his family have fled from their village to a safe location, leaving most of their personal belongings behind. According to a church member, Pastor Santiago is on the guerrillas' hit list for his refusal to support their illicit activities, prompting his decision to flee with his family. Pastor Santiago also shared with VOM staff that he had received death threats for preaching the gospel. His greatest concern is for his family and their provision if anything happens to him. Fearing for their lives, most members of Pastor Santiago's church have either left the village or plan to leave soon. Pray for Pastor Santiago and the affected families from this village, including a teenage girl from the church who was kidnapped earlier this year and has not been heard from since.



October 24, 2024 | Nepal

Christian Wife Stands Firm Despite Continuous Abuse

Goma Kunwar has suffered repeated beatings and mistreatment at the hands of her Hindu husband since putting her faith in Christ in 2022. More than once, his attacks have been life-threatening. On Jan. 2, 2024, Goma's husband beat her badly and attacked her with a sickle, cutting her head so that she required medical treatment. Despite the abuse, Goma does not want to leave the Lord. Pray that she will receive the physical and emotional care she needs; that her husband, Tek Bahadur, will come to faith in Jesus Christ; and that her faithfulness to the Lord will be a testimony to the friends and neighbors who are urging her to give up her faith.

October 31, 2024 | Benin Young Christian Escapes Voodooist Family

Marc. 21. battled a chronic illness and could not find a cure. He visited doctors and voodoo practitioners, but nothing seemed to help. Then a friend urged him to come to church. When Marc heard the gospel, he became a follower of Christ and was physically healed, later deciding to receive baptism. When he returned home from the baptismal service, his voodooist father had hired people to beat him. His father was upset that Marc, his oldest son, would forsake his duties to the family's voodoo rituals and told him to leave. Marc stayed at a relative's house, but some family members locked him in a room and tried to force him to return to pagan practices. Eventually he escaped through a window. Today, he lives with a pastor's family, is trying to find a job, and hopes someday to preach the gospel. He said, "What made me to have courage is Jesus says in the Bible, 'I will never abandon vou.""

Biblical Word for You!

Meaning of Tzel (לֵצ)

Pronunciation: tzehl

What It Means:

"Tzel" (לצ') is the Hebrew word for "shadow," but it's more than just a dark shape cast by light—it carries also a deep spiritual significance, often symbolizing protection, divine presence, and refuge in the Bible.

Why It Matters:

"Tzel" appears in important biblical contexts, such as in Psalm 91:1: *"He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will rest in the shadow of the Almighty."* This imagery of tzel is often used in scripture to describe God's own character—He offers shade, shelter, and protection to all people.

Fun Fact:


In the desert, the Israelites were led by a cloud—essentially a "shadow" from God—providing protection from the harsh sun. In Numbers 14:9, Joshua tells the Israelites that the Canaanites are defenseless because their "shade" (tzel) has been removed, leaving them without divine protection.

But tzel also has another meaning. Jacob wrestles with his own shadow—his inner struggles—before resolving his conflict with Esau, reminding us that true transformation often comes from confronting our inner selves.

What About You?:

Can you think of a time when you felt like you were in a "tzel"—a moment when you experienced protection or comfort during a difficult time? Or perhaps a moment when you wrestled with your own "shadow"?
