God's call to courage is not a call to naïveté or ignorance. We aren't to be oblivious to the overwhelming challenges that life brings.

We must pay much closer attention to what we have heard, so that we do not drift away from it. — Hebrews 2:1 NASB

Do whatever it takes to keep your gaze on Jesus.

When a friend of mine spent several days in the hospital at the bedside of her husband, she relied on hymns to keep her spirits up. Every few minutes, she stepped into the restroom and sang a few verses of "Great Is Thy Faithfulness." Do likewise! Memorize Scripture. Read biographies of great lives. Ponder the testimonies of faithful Christians. Make the deliberate decision to set your hope on him.

As followers of God, you and I have a huge asset. We know everything is going to turn out all right. Christ hasn't budged from his throne, and Romans 8:28 hasn't evaporated from the Bible. Our problems have always been his possibilities.

Feed your fears, and your faith will starve. Feed your faith, and

your fears will.

We know everything is going to turn out all right. That's the promise of Romans 8:28. But it's hard to remember when all the possibilities of what could go wrong are swirling around us. When fear is plentiful, let's fix our gaze on Jesus and remember this:

We know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose.

The presence of fear does not mean you have no faith. Fear visits everyone. Even Christ was afraid (Mark 14:33). But make your fear a visitor and not a resident. Hasn't fear taken enough? Enough smiles? Chuckles? Restful nights, exuberant days? Meet your fears with faith. Do what my father urged my brother and me to do. Summertime for the Lucado family always involved a trip from West Texas to the Rocky Mountains. (Think Purgatory to Paradise.) My dad loved to fish for trout on the edge of the white-water rivers. Yet he knew that the currents were dangerous and his sons could

be careless. Upon arrival we'd scout out the safe places to cross the river. He'd walk us down the bank until we found a line of stable rocks. He was even known to add one or two to compensate for our short strides. As we watched, he'd test the stones, knowing if they held him, they'd hold us. Once on the other side, he'd signal for us to follow.

"Don't be afraid," he could have said. "Trust me."

We children never needed coaxing. But we adults often do. Does a river of fear run between you and Jesus? Cross over to Him.

Believe He can. Believe He cares.

Does the path ahead look uncertain, even frightening? Maybe this image will help. When a father leads his four-year-old son down a crowded street, he takes him by the hand and says, "Hold on to me." He doesn't say, "Memorize the map." Or, "Take your chances dodging the traffic." Or, "Let's see if you can find your way home." The good father gives the child one responsibility:

THE SIN OF WORRY

Do not worry about your life, what you will eat, nor about the body, what you will put on. Life is more than food, and the body is more than clothing. Luke 12:22-23

Let me begin by stating something that you may or may not agree with: worry is sin. Worry is not part of our personality; it is not something to be excused because "everybody does it." From God's perspective, worry is sin. But in order to clarify this (it's important to know when we are sinning and when we are not), let's separate worry from concern.

It is certainly right to be concerned about things that are your responsibility and over which you exercise control. God expects us to be responsible, to be concerned that we follow through on what is ours to do. But worry is concerning yourself about things over which you have no control. Worry is allowing care and concern to escalate beyond the realm of responsibility and into a realm in which you have no authority or control - God's realm; and that kind of concern, which is worry, is sin.

When we worry, we deny the faithfulness of God-and that is why worry is sin.

Silent Night, Holy Night

Inspiration comes from: 100 Favorite Hymns by Stacy Edwards

Originally written in German, "Silent Night, Holy Night" is the only one of Joseph Mohr's works to be translated into English. It was written for a Christmas Eve service at Mohr's church, but it didn't catch on for a couple of decades. By the middle of the nineteenth century, however, its popularity had spread. Bing Crosby's version of this Christmas classic is the fourth best-selling single of all time. (You really can't go wrong with a Crosby-Christmas combo.)

Over the years, some have questioned the concept of a "silent night" when the song is about a baby being born in a stable. Surely, they claim, there were cries of babe and mother mingled with the noise of various animals. I fear those individuals may have missed the point entirely. It was a silent night in that it was a holy night.

There is a stillness in holiness that causes worldly noise to fade into the background.

Lord, what a holy night it was when love came down to earth.

Take a moment and read the words to Mohr's hymn. Think about it not in terms of a birth story but as God entering the world.

Imagine the hush of Heaven as all the host held their breath. **Envision the awe** of the shepherds.

See a silent Joseph who just witnessed the Son of God being born.

Did a cattle low? Sure.

A baby cry? Absolutely.

But make no mistake. It was a silent, holy night.

Lord, what a holy night it was when love came down to earth.

Entire Village Changed by God's Word

As Musa was serving as an imam in his village in East Africa, he kept hearing about his son, Saad, preaching the gospel throughout the village. Saad's bold witness angered other local Muslim leaders, who warned Musa to stop Saad from evangelizing. Though Musa didn't find any fault with his son's evangelistic activities, he decided to confront Saad

about them. But when Musa went to Saad, something surprising happened. Saad was studying the Bible with his pastor, and Musa watched and listened as Saad and the pastor discussed different verses. "He was so impressed at what he was hearing," a front-line worker said. "He asked them if he could also join them to really understand what the Bible is teaching." Musa then placed his trust in Christ, which has impacted the whole village. "As a result of his conversion, almost everyone in his village is now Christian," the front-line worker reported.


Jail Time Provides Fruitful Ministry

When Kashvi was visiting her Hindu sister-in-law in the hospital, sharing the gospel and praying with her, another person in the hospital heard her and called the police. Kashvi was arrested under state anti-conversion laws and spent three days in jail. While in jail, she said, she had no fear or worry. She had an opportunity to minister to a girl who had been in prison for two years. Many of the Hindu prisoners and some of the police officials also asked her to pray for them, and she was able to share the gospel with the police superintendent, who had asked her to pray for him after noticing her character and honesty. Since being released, Kashvi has continued her outreach to women in the jail and their children. Pray for Kashvi's ongoing ministry and for those who heard the gospel during her imprisonment.

November 28, 2024 | Lebanon

Front-Line Workers Face Danger in War Zones

Christians compose 33% of Lebanon's population, the largest percentage of Christians in any Middle Eastern country, which has made Lebanon a place of refuge for many persecuted Christians from throughout the region. But the ongoing conflict in the region has created a dangerous environment for front-line workers there. "Bombing is happening on a daily basis in Lebanon," said one front-line worker. "And one happened very close to one of our workers as he went to meet with some persecution survivors." The worker requests prayer for "all the churches and Christians there to be fruitful instruments in the hands of the Lord to spread the gospel in such volatile and dangerous circumstances in Lebanon."
